Staged Return to Onsite Learning

As advised by the Government Health Authorities, students will be making a staged return to onsite learning. In order to facilitate a safe return for students, the Victorian Government has assigned different days for each year level to learn onsite. On days that they will not be onsite, children will continue with remote and flexible learning. Please familiarise yourself with the dates and days that your child/ren will be onsite.

Prep students begin October 18th: will return three days a week on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesday.

Year 1 and 2 students begin October 21st: will return two days a week on Thursdays and Fridays.

Year 3 and 4 students begin October 26th: will return two days a week on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

Year 5 and 6 students begin October 28th: will return two days a week on Thursdays and Fridays.

Vulnerable children and children of parents or guardians who are on the authorised provider and authorised worker list can continue attending onsite.

All students will return to school full time by Friday 5th November

Monday 8th and 9th November is the extended cup weekend and there will be no school.

Please be aware that all of the above dates are subject to health advise and may be changed.

Morning Arrival and Afternoon Pickup Arrangements

Currently No Parents Permitted Onsite

In order to reduce movement and minimise any possible transmission of Covid-19, Cana has decided to adopt the following practices for safe morning drop-offs and afternoon pickups. Please make sure students arrive during the designated time. **At this time, we will need your understanding and cooperation, parents will not be permitted onsite.** During the drive thru drop-offs and pick-ups, only students will be permitted onsite. Teachers will be present to supervise and ensure the safety of students in the mornings and after school.

Walking to School/Walking Home

- Drop off/Pick up areas are:
 - Drive thru across basketball area
 - Front school gate (office)
 - Back gate
- Children may walk to school, and enter and exit the school via the gates at the front office or at the back of the school. Parents are to wait at these exit gates, observing 1.5m social distancing.
- Please ensure that your child knows the following:
 - Are the children walking home, e.g. back gate or front gate
 - Who will be meeting them if this pertains to you
 - What to do if it rains
 - What to do if parent/carer is not there (children can come back to office area to wait safely)
- If parents or carers will be delayed/late, please ring the school prior to pick up, it is extremely difficult if you ring right on bell time. We will do our best to communicate this to the teachers/students.

Drive Thru/Drop-Off/Pick-Up

- Gates will open at 2.50 **do not arrive before this time**, children will be ready at 3pm/3.10pm.
- **Do not park in neighbours driveways, our driveway, or anywhere where you will block traffic.** Your children will be safe waiting for you inside.
- There will be no waiting time to pick up your child/ren. It will be **stop, drop/collect and go.**
- Cars may drive into school and park **for up to 2 minute only** for your child(ren) at drop off/pick up times.
- Please ensure that school bags and belongings are ready for quick exits from cars. Kisses and cuddles are for home.
- No parents are to accompany children; children will walk across the basketball court directly to classroom where their teacher will greet them, other staff members will supervise children walking to classrooms.
- Cars will then slowly exit the back car park gate **ONE WAY ONLY.**
- Please ensure your child(ren) know if you will be driving into school to pick them up.

All of the above have caused some children a great deal of anxiety when they are not clear about your plans/expectations.

Covid Testing Information

This is an important message for families with students currently on site, and for all families once on site learning begins again. Please note that if any person living with the child/ren attending Cana are waiting for COVID test results, **your child/ren CANNOT attend Cana for onsite learning until the results come back negative**. This is to prevent Cana from having to close down in the event that a result returns positive.

Thank you for your understanding and for abiding by the current COVID safety guidelines.

DO NOT COME TO SCHOOL WHEN SICK

Another reminder to families that children **ARE NOT** to be brought to school if they are unwell or showing **ANY COVID** like symptoms. If they are brought to school, we will need to send them home. **DO NOT** tell your children to 'see how they go', if they are unwell.

Face Masks

As directed by the Victorian Government:

- A new mandate issued by the Victorian Government has been put in place whereby **ALL** students from **Grade 3 upwards**, will be required to wear face masks when indoors.
- We ask that you ensure that your child/ren have been supplied with masks each day to use while engaged in classroom learning activities.
- We understand there may be some exceptions. However, the intention of this directive is to maximise safety while children are at school.
- ***Please communicate any exemptions or individual circumstances to your child's teacher via email prior to their return to onsite learning.***
- Children in Grades Prep, 1 and 2 are highly encouraged to wear masks indoors.
- For communication purposes, teachers and education support staff are not required to wear face masks while teaching, but it is recommended that face masks be worn while teaching wherever practicable.

A **face mask must cover the nose and mouth**. Face shields, scarves or bandanas do not meet these requirements.

Ventilation

Ventilation is a high priority in order to ensure clean air quality is provided for our students. We will increase fresh air flow into indoor classroom spaces, including shared spaces throughout the school. Cana has been advised by the Victorian Government that we will receive air purifiers for our school. Unfortunately, we do not have a date when this will occur, but we will implement the following:

Natural Ventilation: we will keep windows, doors and vents open as much as possible, ensuring fresh air flow occurs in all classrooms and shared spaces. We are hopeful the air purifiers will be sent ASAP.

Summer Uniform

As of next week, students coming back onsite **must** wear their hats when playing outside. Currently children can come to school in either their summer or winter uniform. As of 8th November full summer uniform must be worn. Children will be permitted to wear runners with their uniform if they have outgrown their school shoes.

Specialist Days

Children will be with their classroom teachers on the days they are onsite during the staggered start. Specialist days will be on the days that they are at home. Please see the table below for when your child will have their specialist classes via learning grids.

In Term 4 we welcome a new crossing lady to our school. Robin will be at the front of the school every morning and afternoon to make sure that all children are able to cross the road safely.





PARISH UPDATE 82

*“The current COVID lockdown means that **our churches will remain closed** for the duration of the lockdown – date and details are not clear at this stage. The exception is for funerals, with ten ‘mourners’ permitted. There will be no other activity in our churches over that time. See attachment for information for accessing Mass on TV and online.”*

Greetings, everyone!

Now in mid-October, our ‘re-opening group’ gathered during the week to check our procedures and supplies for the time when we will be allowed to gather again in our churches for Mass and other Sacraments. We don’t know yet when that will be. Whenever that is allowed, it is sure that it will be a gradual easing of restrictions, just like other times: small numbers permitted to start with – which means booking in advance in order to come; masks; sanitising; keeping a distance from one another. A further complexity this time is with the discussion of ‘double vaccination’. Again, there is no advice from government and Archdiocese at this stage about how this will affect entry into churches. The clear advice from the Archdiocese is: “get vaccinated!”

(Another ‘pop-up’ vaccination centre comes to our neighbourhood this weekend: on Friday (16th), Saturday (17th) and Saturday (18th) at St Albans Secondary College in Main Road East. See an attachment with this letter for further details.)

On the anniversary of the canonisation of Mary MacKillop (17th October 2010), one of the Sisters has reflected on Mary’s approach: “She will be forever a reminder that our nation is at its greatest when we care for all in our communities, especially the most vulnerable”, quoting the then Premier of NSW. That speaks of a responsibility that can be applied to the situation of this pandemic and vaccination – caring for the wellbeing of those around us.

The reflection in that attachment draws attention to the continuing process of the Plenary Council. With its face-to-face (by Zoom) first formal Assembly having drawn to a close, the members now go into a phase of review, listening, dialogue, prayer, discernment. They will gather formally again next year. That attachment offers a reminder that “Mary MacKillop did not shy from the challenges of her time. Neither must we. We, too, must inform ourselves and take whatever steps are necessary within our ambit of influence, so that the Church can be recognised as an authentic voice proclaiming the reality of God’s Love.”

This been the constant call for the Church, hasn’t it? Through the Gospels and the other writings of the New Testament, there is the constant call for ‘conversion’, to be growing and developing in the ways of faith. The Latin phrase ‘semper reformanda’ is a mantra for the Church, ‘always to be reformed’. At the convening of the Second Vatican Council, Pope John 23rd instructed that ‘the substance of the faith is one thing; the ways in which we present and live that is another thing. And it is the latter that we must be paying attention to ‘.

We continue to pray for the work of the Plenary Council – see an attachment with this Letter.

This weekend holds Life, Marriage and Family Sunday. In other years, couples who are celebrating a ‘significant’ wedding anniversary have been invited to the Cathedral to celebrate Mass together with the Archbishop. Alas, the reach of COVID into our lives!

I like the practical and realistic observations of Pope Francis:

Perfect families do not exist. This must not discourage us. Quite the opposite. Love is something we learn; love is something we live; love grows as it is 'forged' by the concrete situations which each particular family experiences. Love is born and constantly develops

amid lights and shadows. Love can flourish in men and women who try not to make conflict the last word, but rather a new opportunity. An opportunity to seek help, an opportunity to

question how we need to improve, an opportunity to discover the God Who is with us and never abandons us. This is a great legacy that we can give to our children, a very good lesson: we make mistakes, yes; we have problems, yes. But we know that that is not really what counts. We know that mistakes, problems and conflicts are an opportunity to draw closer to others, to draw closer to God.

In a less formal way, Pope Francis has also said:

The perfect family doesn't exist, nor is there a perfect husband or a perfect wife, and let's not talk about the perfect mother-in-law! It's just us sinners. A healthy family life requires frequent use of three phrases: "May I? Thank you, and I'm sorry" and "never, never, never end the day without making peace."

A Prayer for Married Couples is included in an attachment with this letter.

On my walk the other day, coming from Horseshoe Bend Park to Keilor Village, I noticed a house whose large front window had Christmas decorations in it! Yes, it's ten weeks to Christmas! Then I saw Christmas decorations in Reject Shop. Perhaps I'm a bit slow off the mark!!

Whatever about that, this Sunday's Readings remind us that courage and perseverance are some of the qualities needed to continue living our life of faith. So much impacts on our lives. Much is asked of us if we are truly to be disciples of the Lord. Along with these attitudes, this Word also reflects on 'servant leadership'. This means placing the needs of others before your own desires for notice or authority. The teaching is that everyone in the family can be this sort of 'servant leader' to the others.

If you are considering participating in the Ministries in our Parish when we are allowed to re-open, follow the information and instructions on another attachment with this Letter. (This includes those who have been part of Ministry before – we're starting again with a 'blank page' so that our records are all coordinated.)

As we continue to let our being disciples of Jesus shape our lives in all things, Blessings and Prayers for all!

Safeguarding Sunday –September 12, 2021

This weekend, the Catholic Church in Australia marks Safeguarding Sunday.

The Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne and Sacred Heart/Emmaus Parish are committed to the care, wellbeing and protection of children, young people and people at risk in our community. Safeguarding and the dignity of every person is the responsibility of every adult.

A significant impact of COVID lockdowns for the Sacred Heart/Emmaus Parish has been that we have had to limit severely all our Ministry activity.

When restrictions begin to ease we will be in a position to reassemble our various ministry groups. That will be the opportunity to re-engage with our community in those well-established 'tried and true' ways, to re-form our groups and invite new participation, and to offer 'formation for ministry' as a refresher or an introduction.

To get ready for that, there are some administrative details that we can prepare. It is the policy of the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne that *everyone* in *every* Ministry within each Parish must hold a valid Working With Children Check (WWCC).

I invite all who have previously been involved in Ministry and also those who wish to participate for the first time to build up this aspect of our Parish's life again!

There is a list of our Ministry areas on the next page.

To ensure that all involved in Ministries have complied with the requirement for holding a Working With Children Card, please complete the information on the attached form and send it to the Parish Office: this will indicate your choice for participation in Ministry.

If you have a WWCC already, include a copy of that.

If you do not have a WWCC, the procedures for acquiring one are on a following page. When a Card is sent to you, forward a copy to the Parish Office.

Surging wonder and gratitude were unexpected feelings for me when I saw the picture of Mary MacKillop hanging on the walls of St Peter's Basilica on the day of the canonisation, 17 October 2010. World recognition of the workings of God through this woman was an awe-inspiring thing indeed.

In her Ministerial Statement made to the New South Wales Parliament that day, the then Premier, Kristina Keneally, [pointed out](#) that while Mary MacKillop's canonisation was significant for the universal church, it spoke to Australians in particular:

"She will be forever a reminder that our nation is at its greatest when we care for all in our communities, especially the most vulnerable. She will always be known as a great pioneer of egalitarianism, mateship and compassion that we now call a fair go. Her life is inspiring to any Australian."

In past days the Catholic Church in Australia has been listening in Plenary Council to the voices of those responding to questions about how the Church can be a credible sign and instrument of God's saving work in this country. Like Mary MacKillop in her time, we experience a Church in need of conversion. Mary knew its weaknesses; she suffered under systems that allowed the misuse of power.

More than a hundred years have passed since Mary MacKillop urged her Sisters to look beyond this experience with hope, to courageously become in themselves sign and instrument of God's compassionate love. At the time of the canonisation, Notre Dame de Namur Sister Ishbel MacPherson, a relative of Mary MacKillop, quoted the saint as saying, 'Sisters must be trained spiritually and in worldly knowledge necessary to enable them to take the stand the Church in Australia requires of them' (*Good Works*, Vol. 6, No. 3, March 2011).

Mary MacKillop did not shy from the challenges of her time. Neither must we. We, too, must inform ourselves and take whatever steps are necessary within our ambit of influence, so that the Church can be recognised as an authentic voice proclaiming the reality of God's Love.

Teilhard de Chardin [warns us](#) that the work of God proceeds slowly:

"We are impatient of being on the way to something unknown, something new. And yet it is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability and that it may take a very long time." Much effort and prayer have gone into preparations for the Plenary Council, and hopes are high. At the same time, unless we tap into the basis of our hope, we will lose patience with elements of Church seemingly resistant to reforms that would enable God's word to speak in the language of our time.

As we recall the universal celebration of what God achieved for the people of our land and beyond through Mary MacKillop, we are reminded to see and hear again God's promise that life comes out of death and that Love's power transforms our lives.
