Cana Catholic Primary School has a commitment to the care, safety and wellbeing of children.

Dear Cana Families,

As you are aware, Cana is committed to the safety and wellbeing of all its students. Like all Catholic schools, Cana is governed by Child Safety Standards. The Child Safety Standards were established for organisations to create a culture of safety by adopting and actioning strategies to keep children safe from harm.

Standard 3 of the Child Safety Standards, Child and Student Empowerment, highlights the rights of students to establish protective factors. Some of the protective factors include, but are not limited to, your child knowing what to do when he/she feels unsafe, pathways for your child should they wish to raise concerns of safety, which includes the online environment.

In Term 4, an educative safety program will be delivered from Prep to Grade 6 called the **Daniel Morcombe Child Safety Curriculum**.

Students will learn within this program how to recognise, react and report if they feel unsafe. Students will also identify private body parts using anatomical names with reference to body ownership. The research evidence tells us that this is a protective factor that increases student's ability to unambiguously communicate the nature of harm they might experience and seek help.


All sessions will be delivered by your child's teacher within an age-appropriate approach and in a safe and inclusive environment.

Enlightened by faith and the words of Jesus who said, 'I have come that you may have life, and have it to the full' (John 10:10) we at Cana, have a responsibility to ensure that all children in our school community are safe and have every opportunity to flourish.

PARISHIONER FORUM



Message From Fr. Maurie

Hello everyone!

Very 'soggy' this morning; and traffic snarl in Taylor's Road where the road dips under the rain line – again! And what a day to finish the first week of school term – a 'wet day programme'. Hope you're warm and dry and safe and in good spirits!!

I mentioned last week our four 're-emerging projects': Ministry Groups reassembling, updating Parish records (thank you for cooperating with that Census Card task), Thanksgiving review and planning, intention to develop a Parish Advisory Group.

The third of those – Thanksgiving review and planning – features at Masses and mailouts this week: see an attachment with this email for information on that.

There was much talk during the week about styles of leadership: further comment from the death of Elizabeth II and the ascension of Charles III; leadership in Ukraine and Russia and the United Nations; the AFL and its clubs. That took me to thoughts of the significance of ourselves, the people; and I found these two pieces from our Tradition:

To be holy does not require being a bishop, a priest or a Religious. We are frequently tempted to think that holiness is only for those who can withdraw from ordinary affairs to spend much time in prayer. That is not the case. We are all called to be holy by living our lives with love and by bearing witness in everything we do, wherever we find ourselves.

Are you called to the consecrated life? Be holy by living out your commitment with joy.

Are you married? Be holy by loving and caring for your husband or wife, as Christ does for the Church. Do you work for a living? Be holy by laboring with integrity and skill in the service of your brothers and sisters.

Are you a parent or grandparent? Be holy by patiently teaching the little ones how to follow Jesus.

Are you in a position of authority? Be holy by working for the common good and renouncing personal gain. POPE FRANCIS (2018: Call to Holiness in Today's World)

You are not what you do, although you do a lot.

You are not what you have collected in terms of friendships and connections, although you might have many.

You are not the popularity that you have received.

You are not the success of your work.

You are not what people say about you, whether they speak well or whether they speak poorly about you. All these things that keep you quite busy, quite occupied, and often quite preoccupied, are not telling the truth about who you are.

I am here to remind you in the name of God that you are the Beloved Daughters and Sons of God, and the God says to you, "I have called you from all eternity and you are engraved from all eternity into the palms of my hands. You are mine. You belong to me, and I love you with an everlasting love." HENRI NOUWEN (2017Daily Meditations for spiritual living)

REFLECTION

BEING THANKFUL

Our faith is an element of our identity, and part of that is to let our faith shape our attitudes, words, and actions. In this week's Word of God, that takes the form of noticing the signs of the presence and blessings of God, and being thankful for that. A core meaning of the Eucharist for which we gather again is its being our communal act of Thanksgiving. Be thankful!

Our young Parishioners who celebrated First Communion this year [and others before them] know well that the basic meaning behind our familiar term 'Eucharist' is THANKFULNESS for what has been **done so** well. That's the 'eu' part of the word. We use that in other familiar terms: in a 'eulogy' at a funeral we speak well of the person who has died, expressing thanks that we have shared in this life.

We are thankful people as we gather for Eucharist each week – thankful for the renewing presence of Christ given to us again and again, thankful for the community of faith that we are part of, thankful for the wisdom in the Word of God, thankful for the blessings of the Spirit who will guide us in the week that opens before us. St Paul saw thankfulness as one of the essentials for a person of faith. "Always be thankful" he urged. And that is praised in today's gospel – the story of the one who turned to Jesus in thanks after the group of ten was healed.

So much crowds our lives. Pause occasionally and recognise some of the gifts in your life. Be a thankful person. Try this prayer: "Blessed are you Lord God of all creation, for (fill in the gap here by naming something you are thankful for...). And perhaps surprise someone with a 'Thanks' for something in your life that could so easily be taken for granted!

he Season of Creation is a graced time in the Church, a celebration of our relationship with God our Creator and all creation. The celebration begins on September 1st, the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, and concludes on October 4th, the feast of St Francis of Assisi, patron of ecology. During the month-long celebration Christians are invited to "Listen to the Voice of Creation".

A symbol for the Season of Creation this year is the flame in the burning bush, seen by the prophet Moses when he arrived at Mt Horeb, the mountain of God. Moses saw that the burning bush was not consumed by the flame and turned aside to see this marvel of creation. God told Moses the ground on which he was standing was holy and asked him to lead the people out of misery. The flame in the bush would be a sign of God's enduring presence and love (Exodus 3:1-12).

The Season of Creation helps us to reflect on the holy ground of where we are. In everyday life there is evidence

The ecumenical Season says, "creation never stops proclaiming". It is a time for us to use our senses and open our hearts and minds. Thomas Merton, the American Trappist monk, said: "Let us come alive to the splendour that is all around us and see the beauty in ordinary things". Having a sense of place helps us to grow in our relationship with God and be bearers of God's good news, bringing freedom, peace and happiness to God's people and all creation.

People who spend time observing and listening to creation, often speak of a deep sense of awe and reverence for God's gifts. There is a wonderful majesty about the intelligence of living beings and the inter-workings of the community of life. Noticing the amazing wonders of creation can be illuminating experiences of God's abundant grace.

In the turmoil of pandemic lock-downs, local parks and natural features became places of refuge and spiritual renewal. Fourteenth-century English Anchoress, Julian of Norwich, who lived at the time of the Black Death, said: "There is a Force of love moving through the universe that holds us fast and will never let us go."

God's loving Self burst forth in the creation of the universe, revealed by modern science to be fourteen billion years old. Columban Fr Liam O'Callaghan, the Columban Peace, Ecology and Justice coordinator in Pakistan, says we are called to think in a bigger way and to revise our theological concepts about the presence of God in creation to include

the story of the universe. Fr Liam says if we can expand our thinking and theology, this can make a huge difference in our age of social and ecological crisis.

Personal experiences and the insights of science and our faith tradition inspire many people to nurture the beauty of creation and notice that all is not well. The web of life is in danger from unprecedented rises in global temperature and environmental destruction, leading to major disruption and suffering. This year in Australia, severe floods in Lismore, Brisbane and Sydney have brought immense suffering to so many people. The magnitude and frequency of weather events such as these are attributed to global warming.


The 2021 State of the Environment Report, recently published in Australia, declared the state of health of the Australian environment is poor and deteriorating. Australia has lost more mammal species than any other continent and increasing numbers of plant and animal species and whole ecological communities are threatened. Among those listed as critically endangered are the Leadbeater's possum and the helmeted honeyeater. These unique animals represent a sense of pride about place as emblems of the State of Victoria, but their survival is now in jeopardy. Koalas have also recently been added to the endangered list in several states across Australia.

These animals are just one among many species of plants and animals in a similar plight worldwide. Extinctions are occurring at rates never experienced before in Earth's history. The figures are so large they are difficult for us to comprehend. Major causes of the loss of animal and plant species are climate change, habitat loss, invasive species, pollution, and resource extraction.

Over the past four years of the Fifth Plenary Council, the Church in Australia has been listening to explore what it is we are called to do and how we are called to be God's presence today and into the future. Many voices were lifted through the meetings of the Plenary Council, including the cries of Earth. It is clear that the Church in Australia is deeply concerned and committed to doing more in response.

The Plenary Council acknowledged the unique place of the wisdom of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in caring for Country, long before Abraham "set out for the promised land, and who continue to do so today". As people of faith, we are invited to respond in solidarity to the cries of our times, and our ecological conversion is both a personal and communal commitment. The final document of the Plenary Council stated: "Pope Francis' landmark Encyclical Letter *Laudato Si'* powerfully pointed out that we do not stand outside creation but are joined in a splendid universal communion." The Season of Creation is a timely opportunity to heed creation's voice right around the world.

Rationale

This Cana Catholic Primary School Parent Code of Conduct outlines the way in which our community requires all parents/carers and family members to conduct themselves when visiting our school, and communicating with students, staff and other parents in our school.

The Cana Catholic PS Parent Code of Conduct applies to all adults including parents, guardians, carers, step-parents, grandparents, extended family while involved in activities or communication related to Cana Catholic Primary School.

The School Policy & Advisory Guide, 'Visitors in Schools' requires all visitors to the school during school hours to sign a visitors' register located at the school office, so that their presence in the school is recorded for Child Safety reasons and in the event of an emergency. (excluding Mass and Interschool Sports)

When at school and within the proximity of the school

Parents/Carers will:

- use courteous and acceptable language when communicating with their own children, other students, staff and other parents/carers and members of the school community. There will be zero tolerance to any verbal or physical violence towards others.
- value our diverse community and respect the rights and practices of individuals and their families.
- respect points of view that are different from their own.
- firstly, speak directly to the teacher with any concerns regarding incidents in the school. The teacher will then refer the
 parent to appropriate staff if necessary.
- be mindful of the teacher's time, when wanting to communicate with them. Make a time to meet that does not disrupt the class unless there is a genuine emergency.
- listen respectfully, in the same manner required of students and staff when attending school assembly or informal/formal meetings.
- provide appropriate parental supervision before the bell in the morning and in the afternoon (3.15pm onwards Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, 3.00pm on Tuesdays).
- remove their child from a situation that involves any form of violence and seek support from staff members.
- model positive behaviours in front of all students at all times, whether on school grounds or within the proximity of the school.
- comply with the school onsite parking expectations, with road safety rules and parking signs when dropping off or picking up their children to and from school.
- comply with the Cana Catholic PS Attendance Policy (refer to Cana's website).
- ensure that your child complies with the Cana's School Uniform Policy (refer to Cana website).
- respect all Cana's policies and procedures (refer to Cana's website).
- Respect the privacy of teachers.

Unacceptable Behaviour

Parents/Carers will not:

- discipline a child who is not theirs or speak to a child who is not theirs about that child's behaviour. This is the role of teaching staff. Being approached by an adult they do not know, can be distressing for children. Common sense would prevail if safety was an issue.
- use offensive language towards their own children, students, staff and other parents/carers and members of the school community when on school grounds or within the proximity of the school.
- interrupt or distract a teacher while classroom instruction or learning activities are underway.
- engage with staff, students or parents/carers in an aggressive manner regarding issues of a personal or school nature.
- engage in inappropriate physical contact with students, staff or other parents/carers.
- discriminate between or disrespect any member of our school community.
- disrupt the good order of the school by any means including: in person, via persons representing them or social media.
- Engage a teacher about school matters outside the school environment.

When making a complaint

Parents have the right to raise issues and concerns related to the education/welfare of their child or other school matters.

There are a number of ways you can raise any concerns you have about your child. You can:

- write a note or email your child's teacher outlining your concerns
- make an appointment to speak on the phone or in person with the class teacher or Wellbeing Coordinator; ensuring that you inform the school about the issue you wish to discuss
- consider speaking with the school's student wellbeing Coordinator/Leader if you feel that is appropriate
- arrange any meeting times or phone calls through the school office (this is more convenient for both you and your child's teacher and does not interrupt teachers during the time they need to be with their students)

Remember that the class teacher together with others who may be involved, should be given a reasonable amount of time to take the steps required to resolve or address your concerns.

Consequences of a Breach of Cana's Parent Code of Conduct

Any parent, member of school staff or student may notify the Principal of a possible breach of the Cana Parent Code of Conduct. The Principal will investigate the complaint and if satisfied that a breach has occurred will:

- A meeting may be terminated at any time if there is a breach of conduct
- provide a first and final warning that a breach of the Cana Code of Conduct has occurred and that a further breach will not be tolerated 🔛
- issue a trespass warning to the parent if the behaviour was one of an aggressive manner. If the behaviour continues, may
 accelerate to a trespass notice prohibiting the parent from coming on school grounds for a designated period of time,
 determined by the Principal or their representative in line with DET guidelines

Regular review

This document will be reviewed every year in consultations with parent representatives, and following significant incidents if they occur. We will ensure that families have the opportunity to contribute. Where possible we do our best to work with local Aboriginal communities, culturally and/or linguistically diverse communities and people with a disability.

ARE THEY OLD ENOUGH?

Amongst the many advantages of the online world, there are many important things families need to consider when their child is online. Of late, I have been hearing that many of our students are online platforms that are designed for 13-year-old children or older. Further to this, our students are not using these platforms in an appropriate way. There has been reports of students having a 'pack mentality' and exhibiting threatening behaviour towards others while online. In exploring these with the students, they shared that they didn't understand what the other students meant by their comments.



Now we, as adults, all know what that feels like don't we? How many times do we reread a text to try and understand the tone, the intension and how best to respond? Children find reading tone and intention of written text, because of their developmental age, extremely difficult. These were my findings this week, amongst our students.

This has raised concerns!! Even though the school can highly recommend that students are on appropriate online platforms, it is the family's ultimate decision.

We understand how difficult navigating the online world is, particularly having conversations with our children about it. I have included a link to the eSafety Commissioner that covers the topics below. It is highly recommended that you visit the site and empower yourself as families to support your child while online. https://www.esafety.gov.au/parents/skills-advice/are-they-old-enough

Does your preschool child have access to connected devices?

81% of parents say their preschool child uses the internet. 37% think their child spends too much time online.

Being online at this age can offer your child opportunities to learn through exploration, play and social interaction. But there may also be some risks if your child uses connected devices without supervision or for extended periods of time.



This might include coming across harmful content, contact with strangers or missing out on physical activity.

Here are our tips for a safe and balanced online experience for your preschool child:

Set ground rules

Establish clear rules and be consistent T.

Be clear on things like when and where devices can be used and when they need to be switched off. A good time to switch off is during family dinner time and when your child is alone in a room.



Limit the amount of time your child spends online to ensure a good balance with physical activity. It can be easy to lose track of time, so setting a timer can help.

Resist any push back

Getting your child off a device can be hard and it can be tempting to give in to their demands. Sticking to the rules at this age will help instil good online habits for your child now and in the future.
